FEBRUARY MEETING NOTES

This wonderful program on "Creating a Perfect Orchid Display" was presented by Arthur Katz, who has served as the North Central Florida Judging Chair. For those who will be entering a niche or working on one of our show's displays, this was very helpful.

The pictures were much more vibrant at the meeting, and it was much easier to identify each of the nine ingredients of a good display given in the list of the first photo. Look at the picture to the right of the list. What do you think the focal point of the display is? It is easy to identify. In many Asian displays three pieces of bamboo are used, sometimes in circles as in this display. They are good because they don't distract from the display, even though they are obviously the focal point. In a good display, the judge should not see everything at once. There should be some hidden surprises that will appear the longer you look at the display.



As you continue looking at the rest of the exhibits on this page and the next, write down how you feel about each exhibit. What is the focal point? Is it pleasing or does it overwhelm the exhibit? What is it missing? Does the exhibit feel artistic to you? Why?

There are no right answers, but things should jump out at you that could be improved on, or maybe you just love the whole exhibit but don't know why. Are each of the ingredients present?. Is there open space, but not dead space? Does it flow? Do you feel harmony and balance in the colors? Is there depth? Is it cluttered?



Discussion from the presentation and members about each exhibit is at the end, so you can compare.

Other tips: If your plants have blemishes, it will distract from your display. Maybe use some moss to hide it. Put in your height and depth first, and then fill in with orchids. Too much dead space is not good, but open space in the right place is excellent.

WHICH EXHIBIT DO YOU THINK WAS THE BEST USING ALL OF THE INGREDIENTS?

Here's what we noticed and discussed:

Exhibit 1—Good balance and height. The prop or stone figurine didn't jump out or overwhelm the display.

Exhibit 2—Good use of the outdoor scenery to make a nice backdrop of the trees and cupola. Purple flowers on the right side make a good focal point.

Exhibit 3—Nice and simple. The seven plants don't overwhelm the driftwood and the driftwood doesn't take away from the plants. Driftwood can sometimes overwhelm the scene, but not here. Some might not consider this an exhibit.

Exhibit 4—The theme of the show piece can sometimes be so big and obvious that it overwhelms the display and distracts from the exhibit. However, most of us thought the theme here was so cute and well conceived. Did you notice that the eye chart spells out "Focus on Orchids" which is the theme of the show? You have to admit that is cute.

Exhibit 5—Where is the focal point? It is the greenery at the bottom. Does that seem right? Well, maybe not for an orchid exhibit, but this was at a botanical show and being used to cover a wall. So it was not trying to be an exhibit.

Exhibit 6—Do you see the focal point? Artistic and quirky. Did you like it? We did. There is some dead space at the bottom that judges might not like, but your eye is forced away from it to the focal point, so is it a statement?

Exhibit 7—This had lots of good qualities. We did feel that it would be more balanced if one of the orchids at the right was moved to the bench. Sometimes just standing back makes something obvious.

Exhibit 8—Nice flow, good focal point. It almost looks like a painting. But the exhibitor is an artist, as well as an orchid lover, so no wonder. We hear he won a lot of money for this exhibit in the Japan Show.
